Amtrak's current scheme, Phase VI. Jonathan explained that these cars have officially been in service for 50 years and replacement cars are still several years off. While Amtrak has introduced a new Phase VII paint scheme for the cars, he reminisced on family summer vacations to Washington DC and to Boston, MA in these cars when they were nearly new and painted in their original Phase I paint. Mark Thompson is a collector of hats and shirts from his various summer vacation travels and brought hats from his most recent vacation to Scotland. Paul Wasserman who is well known for his extensive collection of all things prewar Lionel brought several rare paper items including Lionel Magazine, Volume 1 from 1930 and a Lionel Engineer's Club certificate. Included with the certificate was the even rarer pin that was offered as part of the club membership. Chris Allen discussed his affection for McCoy trains and specifically discussed the Main Street Diner from the Seattle Convention. It is distinctive in that the windows only appear on the front side of the diner which indicates that it was specifically designed as a diner unlike other diner models that are traditional coaches made into stationary diners. THOUGHTS ON THE BUS TO BEAT THE HEAT

As most DD members are aware, the three clubs got together to sponsor a bus trip to the annual Beat the Heat meet in Prescott. Dave Brown organized the event and logged in the reservations.

Wrist bands were used for paid meet attendees, and a set was mailed to Dave. When the bus arrived, folks could hop off the bus and head right into the vendor's door to the meet rather than standing in line with the public.

An earlier Beat the Heat tradition was that sandwiches could be reserved and picked up at the meet. That stopped with the recent move of the meet to Embry Riddle University. So, Dave and I arranged to put a lunch option on the reservation form. As the bus traditionally starts at my place, I ordered homemade sandwiches from my local grocery and when the bus arrived, all with lunch reservations headed into my guest house to grab a favorite.

The bus left for my place at 12:45 for lunch and a layout visit here so there would be time for lunch and layout visiting before the public started arriving at 2pm. When we got home, I went downstairs to turn on the lights and the layout when Mary Jane hollered "the bus is here!". It must have been right behind me! By the time I got upstairs to see if all was working OK, I saw people already wandering and sitting outside with their sandwiches. I told Mary Jane to invite those into the house; it is warm outside. CONTROVERSIAL MODEL RAILROAD PRODUCTS

EDITOR'S WARNING: In an era marked by much controversy, this article is quite timely. Please note however, that the following article contains material that may be deemed by some to have inappropriate content. Readers may wish to stop at this point and skip this article.

Model railroading, while often seen as a wholesome hobby, can intersect with broader cultural and ethical discussions. Yet, several model railroad products have sparked controversy or been deemed in bad taste over the years due to political, social, or cultural sensitivities.

The standard of what to include in a model train layout is vastly different for public-facing displays by clubs or individuals as compared to personal home layouts.

The following sections can serve as a checklist for considering what to include or not include in those layouts designed for public viewing.

Holocaust-Themed Cars

Some European model manufacturers, particularly in Germany, produced accurate WWII-era German trains, including boxcars labeled as "Wehrmacht" or resembling those used to deport victims during the Holocaust. These were criticized for insensitivity, especially when not presented in an explicitly educational or historical context. Some manufacturers withdrew or rebranded the items. An Auschwitz concentration camp model railway layout is on public display at Wonderful World of Trains and Planes, Birmingham. However, these types of boxcars are no longer manufactured for public purchase.



Confederate Flag Cars

Model train cars bearing the Confederate flag or symbols of the Confederacy--especially in the 2010's onward—have become increasingly controversial due to the flag's perceived association with racism and white supremacy. Some shows and clubs banned them. Here is the 2010 TCA Atlanta Convention car that probably would not be issued in current times:

The Bachmann On30 Confederate Train Set, including cars decorated with Confederate flags and imagery related to the Confederacy, is no longer available. However, Microscale is still offering Confederate Flag Decals for HO and N-scale.

Alcohol and Beer-branded Cars

Beer-branded cars, like Budweiser reefers, no longer appear in train sets marketed to youth. In the past, concerns were raised over marketing alcohol-related imagery to children, leading to criticism and reevaluation of such products. In the 1990s and early 2000s, major retailers like Walmart and Toys "R" Us reportedly chose not to stock model train sets featuring alcohol branding, such as those from Lionel and MTH, to avoid potential controversies. While specific complaints from parent groups or organizations are not well-documented, these retailer decisions suggest a proactive approach to prevent possible backlash over exposing children to alcohol-themed toys.

Here is an excerpt from a current Walmart product page for a Miller Lite reefer:



Such a warning in our current time may be a bit anachronistic given all the serious problems teenagers and their parents are facing today (e.g., bullying, drugs, depression from social media, etc.) While there is no evidence that the existence of a Lionel beer reefer in a household has ever turned a child into an alcoholic, parents can use discretion in deciding whether to expose their children to these types of cars.

Political

Mikes Train House (MTH) is notorious for pushing the boundaries when it comes to political, cultural or innuendo-based train products.

Almost immediately after the announcement of this garbage-truck product on the O-Gauge Railroad Forum (OGR), there was an explosion of heated comments from all sides of the political spectrum which caused the forum moderators to delete all messages and remove multiple vendor ads for the product.

Religious

Some model railroading clubs have chosen not to display any form of religious symbology in their publicfacing layouts. An example is removing the cross from atop the Plasticville church or not including buildings with obvious religious symbols.

Language

Almost immediately after vendors announced the MTH Ukraine product, the OGR Forum moderators deleted all messages associated with the car over objections to its language content.

Again, MTH pushed the boundaries with their suggestive "buxom melon" product line.

Inappropriate Figures

At a public train show many years ago, I brought a diorama that included a Plasticville outhouse with doors cracked open. It revealed a man and a woman sitting on their respective potties.



A woman who passed by the booth with her son was highly perturbed seeing this and became quite angry at me. I never brought the outhouse to a train show again.

Adult-Themed Model Railroad Products

Adult-themed railroad items are generally banned at public train shows for violating family-friendly standards. These examples highlight the debate within the model railroading hobby about balancing artistic expression and realism with considerations of appropriateness and audience sensitivity.

Nude Decals

A notable example of a model railroad product featuring cartoon or pop culture parodies with adult themes is the line of custom decals produced by Dave's Decals. These decals are designed for N scale model trains and depict graffiti-style artwork with mature cartoon imagery. They are intended for hobbyists aiming to create realistic urban scenes on their model layouts. While some enthusiasts appreciate the added

realism these decals bring to urban-themed layouts, others find the adult content inappropriate, especially in settings frequented by families and children. As a result, some model train clubs and exhibitions have established guidelines or restrictions regarding the display of models featuring explicit or mature-themed content. For instance, the NH110 Dave's Decals - Adult Themed Cartoon Graffiti Boxcar Wall Urban N Scale is one such product that has been discussed in model railroading forums and communities.

Pornographic Model Railroad Accessories

At the 2007 International Toy Fair in Nuremberg, Germany, Viessmann—a well-established German model railroad company--introduced model train accessories that can best be described as pornographic. This addition marked a first foray into adult-themed elements in the model train industry, sparked debates about appropriateness.

- Viessmann 1501 An animated accessory showing a couple in an intimate pose, designed for HO scale model layouts.
- Viessmann 1504 Another animated accessory depicting a couple, intended for adult-themed model train setups.

These accessories, appearing in the Viessman 2007 Catalog, operate on 14 to 16 volts, AC or DC.

Summary

The bottom line is that model railroading is not immune from controversy. However, such controversy has been well-managed through the years by moderator controls for online forums, parental controls, and model train club leadership by not permitting items on layouts that may not be suitable for their visitors.
